MATERIALS & SUPPLIES

First things first, get yourself a sketchbook or notebook to take notes in and/or create sketches. This can be any size and whatever you're comfortable with. **SURFACES:** □ Ultramarine blue ☐ One (1) – 16" x 20" canvas, canvas board, MDF ☐ Cadmium yellow □ Cadmium red panel, or wood panel. ☐ A backing board or something to tape paper to, ☐ Black (Mars, Ivory, Lamp, any will work) gesso on, and work off of. I use a large clipboard, ☐ Titanium white but a small sheet of MDF or plywood might ☐ White Gesso work as well. *you can bring in variations of these colors in addition to. Example: Alizarin crimson and **BRUSHES:** cadmium red, lemon yellow and cadmium A collection of synthetic brushes: yellow, prussian blue and ultramarine blue. **ADDITIONAL SUPPLIES:** ☐ One large, one medium, and one small flat brush (Watercolor or acrylic brushes will work). ☐ A large palette to mix paint on. Glass, plastic, ☐ A couple of smaller round brushes. Medium and enamel, tin, whatever you have. This will allow small. you to mix large pools of color. ☐ For gessoing, you can use a larger hake brush. ☐ A water sprayer (pump preferred) Absorbent and soft. Some of you might already ☐ Paint rags and paper towels. have one you can bring in. ☐ Water container ☐ Pencil □ Palette knife/knives

SURFACES:

For a surface to paint on, often referred to as a support, you can use anything from mixed media paper and sketchbooks with coats of gesso, to pre-primed canvases. We will go over surface preparation to ensure there is a good surface for the paint to stick to.

BRUSHES:

For brushes, I'd get a few flat varieties. There are all sorts of different types or brushes and numbers, like flat, filbert, bright, round, angled, etc., but we can get away with just using flats and rounds. You can use whatever brushes you have laying around. Sometimes I keep old brushes because they make unique marks and textures.

There are all sorts of different brands of paints and it can be both overwhelming and confusing. Just look for the colors on the list and we will work with what you have. Student grade, professional grade, Liquitex, Golden, Windsor Newton, whatever will work. If there is a certain color that is out of stock, look for something that's closest to it. **Heavy body paints preferred.**
